

Be gentle with the tidepool critters. Touching is okay, but don't pull anything off of, or out from under, its rocky home.




Don't leave trash, of course, and bag up a little extra if you see it. The crabs and fish and birds and whales would thank you if they could.




ROAD MAP to FUN

on the Strait of Juan de Fuca Highway




Strait of Juan de Fuca Scenic Byway BINGO





Tidepools at Salt Creek Park




Joyce Museum WORDSEARCH




This old log railroad station is now a local history museum. Come in to see the items on this page, and to learn about the early pioneers, loggers, and homesteaders.

Pysht Tree Farm CROSSWORD PUZZLE




Go Fish in Clallam Bay

Connect the Dots




